Measuring Spiritual Maturity Randy Tompkins 2019-10-21 Jesus commissioned His apostles "and, by extension, the church" to make disciples. Many church leaders have come to the conclusion that attending worship services and Bible study classes will result in making disciples. A review of statistical reports indicates a majority of church members and attenders do not believe this process will work, or they have come to the conclusion they do not want to become disciples. The 2010 US Religion Census report indicated 79% of the 150,686,156 members, children, and other attenders did not attend worship services. It also reported over 60% of the same group did not attend Bible study classes. In 2014 one of the major denominations in the United States reported 63% of church members did not attend worship services and 62% did not attend Bible study classes. There are literally thousands of spiritual surveys available to church leaders. A majority of these surveys develop conclusions based on a single survey being administered or two surveys being administered several months apart. If a disciple-making process is to be effective, there needs to be a method of measuring the progress of individuals moving toward spiritual maturity. This type of measurement would produce a visual of spiritual growth, spiritual decline, or spiritual non-growth. The only way to measure the spiritual progress of an individual is to create a measurement of the various elements of the spiritual life. The process of measuring spiritual maturity in this book is self-contained within the participating church, and the responses of the participating individuals are highly confidential and warehoused by the participating church.

Transference refers to an outcome of training in which students teach their own students the courses they have just learned, resulting in a multiplication of training to multiple levels of teachers. A rapidly expanding church desperately needs a generation of teachers who can teach biblical truth effectively to a large number of believers. This dissertation seeks to meet this need by discovering strategies for accelerating the transference of training. In my literature review, I interact with the social dynamics of relationships, low education levels and advanced age as well as teaching skills related to transference. I also discuss principles of transference in Christian discipleship and in business seminars. While these themes form the foundation for the transference of training, there is a lack of research that directly connects these concepts with the process of transference. My field research addresses this gap by exploring how social dynamics and teaching skills impact the rate of transference. I study these relationships by using the interpretative constructionist theory as a foundation to implement the four methodological tools of participant observation, surveys, interviews and focus groups. Through interaction with fifty-one research participants, I discovered that relationships between pastors and teachers with their students greatly influence the transference of training. I also found that the lower education level and older age of some students can impact their ability to pass on the training. Teaching skills and the contextualization of training material can also affect the successful rate of transference. I apply these findings by suggesting twelve training techniques that can significantly improve transference. Two noteworthy techniques include trainers interacting with the pastors of students and the implementation of co-teaching strategies. I present the preliminary results of a trial run where I actively used the transference strategies. When these twelve strategies are correctly implemented, trainers will be able to accelerate the rate of transference to multiple levels of teachers, thus providing training for the whole church.
